## **Curriculum Intent:**

To know the historical links between the three Dharmic faiths and how these eastern traditions have shaped the history, religious thought, and behaviour of the followers from these faiths. Students will also explore the different ways in which stories and beliefs can be interpreted in many ways and therefore lead to the formation of other worldviews beyond the 'main' faiths. A study of ethics will introduce students to the ways in which non-religious worldviews deal with decision making and the big ethical questions as well as comparing to religious explanations. The applied ethics topic on environmental issues will give students an opportunity to progress through what they have studied to find solutions to modern day ethical problems including climate change and environmental issues.
