


<p><b>Year: 13</b> <b>Subject:</b> <b>Human</b> <b>Geography</b></p>	<p><b>Curriculum Intent:</b> Students will build on their knowledge and understanding of Globalisation and Regenerating Places from Year 12. The Migration, Identity and Sovereignty unit carries over ideas of identity and sense of place from Regenerating Places and applies these concepts to national identity and threats to national sovereignty in a more globalised world. Key concepts surrounding development and power evolve into appreciating how nation states are defined and how they have evolved in a globalising world. Meanwhile, an understanding of organisations impacting globalisation develops into appreciating the changing relevance of international political and economic organisations such as the United Nations in managing some of the greatest challenges of our time. In year 13, we build on the strong foundations laid down in year 12 to access the most challenging content from Geography A Level.</p>
